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Our church building is now COVID-secure, so you can choose either to attend worship physically, or continue to worship with us on Facebook.

Join us at 10.30.am on Sunday in church for a shortened service of Holy Communion, or 6.30pm on Wednesday in church for Mid-Week Praise (posted later on facebook).

Please be aware that there will be no communion at Mid-Week Praise, the communion on Sundays will be bread only and there will be no singing.

To ensure that our church remains COVID-19 Secure, we will be using PowerPoint and not handing out service books. If you prefer, you are welcome to print and bring along your own order of service, taking it with you at the end. For the Sunday service follow the link and download:

NB: If you are not on Facebook, you can still watch the service – follow the link, but when it says “Log in” “Create New Account” simply click “Not Now” (which is below these two options).

Planning to attend our church building for worship? The following COVID-19 Secure restrictions apply:

- Unless you are legally exempt, you must wear a facemask
- Our seating capacity is normally limited to 28 downstairs but can be increased slightly when members of the same household/bubble attend together. There is also limited capacity (15) upstairs.
- Services are basic and short.
- Everyone must gel their hands as they enter the building.
- There is a collection plate on the font, but this will not be passed around.
- Worshippers are expected to remain 2m socially distant from each other, unless from the same household / bubble. This means sitting down promptly (where the paper is on the pew) and no gathering in the aisle or immediately outside the main door for a chat.
- When worshippers enter, they must sit in the next available pew, filling from the front and from the wall, taking care not to touch any part of the pew as you move along. There must be no heading for that favourite pew!
- Everyone (except the presiding priest) will remain seated throughout each service. Unfortunately, this means any children attending must also remain seated throughout the service.
- There is no singing.
- A PowerPoint version of the order of service is projected in church. A version is available to download (Sunday only), but is not available to collect on the way in.
- Worshippers are expected to complete a registration form each week. This is for Track and Trace and the forms will be destroyed after three weeks. A GDPR compliant privacy notice is posted inside church.
- We leave from the rear pew first.
- The toilet is for emergencies only, and anyone using it is expected to spray disinfectant on all surfaces they have touched.

The Church of England advises that certain groups of people may be at increased risk of severe disease from COVID-19, including people who are aged 70 or older, regardless of medical conditions. Whether you wish to accept the increased risk attached to attending worship

with others, or prefer to continue joining with us on Facebook, is entirely your decision.

Anyone showing symptoms of COVID-19 (a new continuous cough, a high temperature or a loss of, or change in, their normal sense of taste or smell) should not join us at 10.30am due to the risk that they pose to others; they should self-isolate at home immediately with other members of their household.

A few words from the Vicar

Early November is a special time for remembering those who have died in times of war and conflict. With All Souls falling on 2nd November, traditionally it is also a season for remembering our departed loved ones before God.

Despite the COVID restrictions, this year is no different.

Normally, we host two packed services in church on Remembrance Sunday. This year, we shall be spreading across two Sundays, treating the period from 1st to 11th November (All Saints to Remembrance Day) as a 'Season of Remembrance'.

Utilising livestreaming and our outdoor space, the plan is to provide a range of COVID secure opportunities for remembering departed loved ones and honouring those who died in war. So:

1. During that period, you are welcome to bring a stone in memory of a loved one and place it on a 'Cairn of Remembrance'. This will be situated close to the churchyard flagpole. You are also welcome to place a 'poppy cross' in front of the flagpole.
2. On 1st November, in the evening at 6.30pm, I will livestream a special service on our Facebook page for those who wish to remember departed loved ones. During the service, those taking part will be invited to light candles at home to remember their loved ones.
3. On All Souls, at 1pm, I shall read the names of departed loved ones aloud in church. It will not be possible for others to join me but, wherever you are, you are welcome to pause for a few moments. If you would like your loved one's name read out, please send an email to me at vicar@ainsworthparish.org.uk .
4. On Remembrance Sunday we gather at 10.45am in the churchyard near the flagpole for a short act of remembrance. This will be followed at 12 noon by a remembrance themed act of worship livestreamed on our Facebook page.

Of all the events planned during our Season of Remembrance, it is the gathering within the churchyard on Remembrance Sunday that is the most vulnerable to the ever-changing COVID restrictions. So far in advance, it is difficult to predict whether it will still be allowed by then. Updates will be notified via our emailed weekly newsletter and on our Facebook page.

By the way, our Remembrance Sunday gathering is not a substitute for any of the local civic gatherings and parades, all of which have been cancelled this year. Rather, in compliance with the COVID restrictions, it will be an act of communal worship on church premises. To be clear, space is limited, and social distancing must be maintained, with no more than six standing together. Also, if you attend, please be careful as the flat gravestones in that area can be slippery in wet weather, as can the church path.

Looking further ahead to Advent and Christmas (yes, it is that time of year already), again there will be a combination of livestreamed and 'in person' worship. For example, our Christingle service will be a livestreamed at 4pm on 6th December. During the service children will be invited to make their Christingles and bring them along to a special Christingle themed Mid-Week Praise on 9th December.

Season Of Remembrance

In previous years, our practice has been to remember departed loved ones before God at a special service on Remembrance Sunday evening. This year, the COVID restrictions mean we must do something different. Planning is underway for a season of remembrance from All Saints to Remembrance (1 - 11 November). Initial plans include the following:

- During this period, everyone is welcome to bring a stone in memory of a loved one and place it on a 'Cairn of Remembrance', which will be near the churchyard flagpole.
- People are also welcome during that period to place a 'poppy cross' in front of the flagpole.
- On 1st November (the nearest Sunday to All Souls) in the evening there will be a special livestreamed service of remembering for those who wish to remember departed loved ones in this way.
- On All Souls (2nd November), during a time of private prayer, the Vicar will read the names of departed loved ones aloud in church, before placing them before the Lord's Table. It will not be possible for others to join him. If you would like your loved one's name read out, please send an email to vicar@ainsworthparish.org.uk.
- On Remembrance Sunday we gather at 10.45am in the churchyard near the flagpole for an act of remembrance. As this is classed as an act of communal worship on church premises, the rule of six does not apply BUT social distancing must be maintained, and space is limited. Also, please be careful as the flat gravestones in that area can be slippery in wet weather.

Christmas Wreaths

The Church Yard Team are able to continue supplying wreaths this year, the cost is £9-95 per wreath.



How to order:

By envelope only – please write your name and contact details on the outside of an envelope, along with the name of the grave on which you would like the wreath to be placed. If you would like to collect the wreath, please write “To be collected” on the envelope.

Enclose your payment, cash / cheque (cheques made payable to Ainsworth Parish Church) in the envelope.

Envelopes can be posted into the box situated at the rear of church, or they can be posted through the letterbox at the Vicarage, the first house on Ainsworth Hall Road (opposite Ainsworth Church & Community Hall).

The wreaths will be placed on the graves on Wednesday 16th December. **Wreaths for collection can only be collected on that day between 09.30 – 11.00.**

Please note that we **cannot deliver wreaths.**

The Children's Society

Well, what a year 2020 has been with so many changes to how we would normally get ready for the Christmas season.

Like many charities, The Children's Society has seen it's income from donations almost come to a standstill during this year, as many of the planned fundraising activities had to be cancelled due to Covid 19.

For Ainsworth, this means that the usual preparations for the Christingle Service have had to be amended. Instead of the collection envelopes and candles being distributed to uniformed organisations and through the Church magazine, a different way of giving is being arranged, and more details will be available in due course.

It is not going to be the usual Christingle Service in Church either, but rather than sit defeated by all the problems, Vicar Dave and Debra and myself have been trying to work out ways for us all to share in the magic of Christingle. We are hoping there will be an online "How to make a Christingle" service, followed by a children's "bring your own Christingle to midweek praise", and in turn an online Christingle Service to enjoy at home mainly aimed at adults. The details are yet to be finalised at the time of writing, but keep a check on the Church noticeboard, the Church website and facebook. If you don't have access to the internet, perhaps you would like to join in shining a light

into the darkness endured by vulnerable children, by lighting your own candle at home at the same time as the online service.

At a time when visiting friends and family is not possible due to local restrictions, sending Christmas cards takes on a greater importance to let loved ones know we are thinking of them.

The Children's Society sells a range of Christmas cards which can be viewed by visiting childrenssociety.org.uk/christmas-cards or phone 01227 811674 to get a brochure. How does ordering cards help young people in dire need? This is Nicky's story.....

Nicky was just 17 when she spent Christmas day all alone, in emergency accommodation. She had been assaulted, groomed, robbed exploited and hospitalised. She was struggling to get through the day, and any thought of the future was unimaginable.

Luckily, Nicky's social worker referred her to The Children's Society, where she met Elizabeth one of the specialist project workers.

Through one to one counselling, Elizabeth was able to support Nicky to tackle the issues she was facing. Elizabeth helped Nicky find a job and a safe place to stay, and importantly, to believe in herself. She started to think about her future and gain hope that it might not be as bad as she had feared. The ongoing support she had from The Children's Society project workers helped her to gain self-esteem and more confidence to improve her situation. Today, Nicky is training to be a teacher. She is still in touch with Elizabeth, but is in a much safer position than she was last year, and is very much happier.

When you donate to The Children's Society, either by buying Christmas cards or giving to Christingle, you are investing in vulnerable children and providing them with hope. They feel forgotten and overlooked, but together we can change that, and ensure they feel valued and helped to overcome whatever their difficulties are.

From the Archives – November 1995

In November 1995, there were a number of references to the Remembrance Sunday Services planned for later that month; the traditional parade service and presentation of wreaths was to be followed in the evening by a joint 'Songs Of Praise' service with members of Ainsworth Methodist Chapel.

The Harvest celebrations the previous month seemed to have gone well, and a note of thanks was included to all those who brought gifts plus all those who gave up their time to help to distribute the gifts.

Moving swiftly on from Harvest was a mention of the Deanery Advent Service to be held at Christ Church Ainsworth, the November Sale to be held later that month, and a special thank you to Mrs. Wittington & Mrs. Schofield for donating some new figures for the Christmas Crib.

A number of reports mentioned the passing of Miss Margaret Jones, who had been a long standing and committed member of the congregation at Christ Church Ainsworth, and according to the Day School report, "... a caring and interested Governor."

As always the various groups and organisations had been busy; Young Families had enjoyed a teddy bear's picnic and a wet, windy coach trip to Southport; Church Women's Fellowship members had enjoyed a talk about the mounted police unit, and were planning a coffee evening; M.U. members were requesting items to be donated for their Tombola and choir members were asking for people to donate cakes for the cake stall. Scouts had been on a night hike; Guides had enjoyed a campfire; and Sunday School reported they had 2 new helpers – Lisa Cunliffe and Rebecca Tarrier.

In November 1995 there were 4 Baptisms and 3 Funerals recorded from the previous month, but no weddings. The number of Communicants for the previous month was listed as 307 and the collections totalled £1124.

Parish Customs And Traditions

A tradition is defined as an inherited, established, or customary pattern of thought, action, or behaviour (such as a religious practice or a social custom). Britain is full of customs and traditions which have been around for hundreds of years. British customs and traditions are famous all over the world; but some are more unusual than others!

November – Soul Caking

A soul cake, also known as a 'soulmass-cake', is a small round cake which is traditionally made for Halloween, All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day to commemorate the dead in the Christian tradition. The cakes, often simply referred to as souls, are given out by 'soulers' who go from door to door during the days of Allhallowtide singing and saying prayers "for the souls of the givers and their friends". The practice in England dates to the medieval period, and was continued there until the 1930s, by both Protestant and Catholic Christians. In Sheffield and Cheshire, the custom has continued into modern times. In Lancashire and in the North-east of England soul cakes were known as 'Harcakes'.

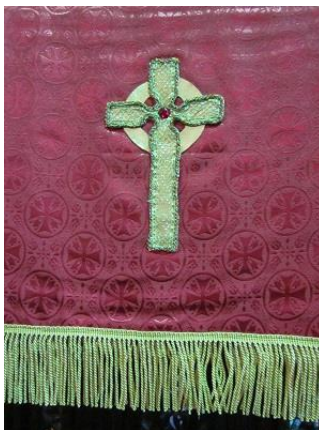

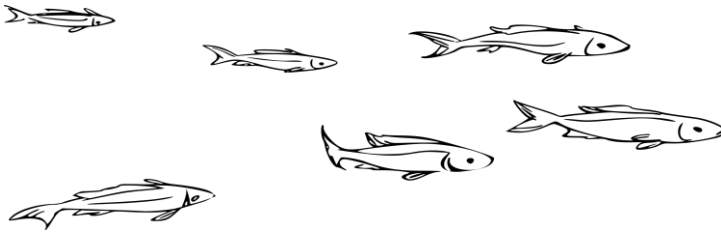

The Season Of Remembrance

November is a very busy and emotional month in the life of the Church. It all begins on the 1st November which is 'All Saints Day'; this is the day on which we particularly remember to thank God for all the Saints who have gone before us, and for all of the incredible things that they achieved.



The next day (2nd November) is 'All Souls Day'; this is a day of celebration to remember those who have died, particularly members of our own families, friends or people that we were close to, and to give thanks to God for their lives.



A few days later, on the 11th November, is Remembrance Day, a day when the whole country comes together to remember and give thanks to God for all those who sacrificed their lives while serving their country in the armed forces.



Remembrance Day

Many of the special dates and seasons that we celebrate in Church date back thousands of years, right back to the days when Jesus was alive; however, Remembrance Day was first celebrated just over 100 years ago, at the end of the first world war.



There are many different reasons and answers to the question "Why did World War 1 start?"; it was a complicated time; a lot of things happened; some people said and did things that maybe they shouldn't have done, and tension built up until the eventual start of World War 1, which began on July 28, 1914. The conflict lasted four years, three months and 14 days, ending on November 11, 1918. During that time many thousands of people lost their lives.

An armistice is a situation in a war where the warring parties agree to stop fighting; the first Armistice Day was observed at

11am on 11 November 1919, throughout the British Commonwealth, to commemorate the armistice agreement that had ended the First World War a year earlier. This agreement had happened at the eleventh hour of the eleventh day of the eleventh month of 1918.



This first official Armistice Day commemoration was held in the grounds of Buckingham Palace and King George V asked the public to observe a 2 minute silence at 11am, "So the thoughts of everyone may be concentrated on reverent remembrance of the glorious dead".



During the Second World War it was agreed that the name 'Armistice Day' should be changed to 'Remembrance Day' so that those who had lost their lives in that war could also be included. In more recent times, servicemen and women killed and injured in other conflicts since the Second World War have also been included, and services are held at parish churches and local memorials across the country on the closest Sunday to Remembrance Day.



So Why Do Some People Wear A Poppy On Remembrance Day?

In many parts of France, after the war was over, fields of bright, red poppies began to grow on the land where many of the major battles had been fought; these poppies were seen as a symbol of hope for the future, but also as reminder of those who had lost their lives during the fighting in those very fields.



Wearing a red poppy shows respect for the many people who died fighting for their country in the First World War and in the conflicts that have followed it.



Remembrance prayer

Dear Heavenly Father,

Forgive the tension, frustration, jealousy and anger that we sometimes feel.

Help us to love our enemies, forgive those who harm us, and try to understand each other's problems,

Through Jesus Christ our Lord - Amen

Remembrance Day Craft Idea - paper poppy wreath

You will need:

1 paper plate

10 or 12 red cup cake cases (or you could use white cases and colour them red)

Black tissue paper scrunched up into 10 or 12 balls

Green card (or you could use white card and colour it green)

Scissors

Green felt tip or crayon

Glue

Here's what to do:

Use a felt tip to write your remembrance message on the middle part of the paper plate.

To make the poppies, place a small blob of glue on the inside of each red cup cake case, then stick a ball of scrunched up black tissue paper into the middle of each cup cake case.

Use the green felt tip to colour all around the outside edge of the paper plate.

Get a grown up to help you to cut some leaf shapes from the green card.

Use the glue to stick the poppies all around the outside edge of the paper plate (the part that you've coloured green)

Finally, tuck the leaf shapes in between the poppies and use more glue to stick them down
